TIPS AND TRICKS

- As you start cutting flowers to make into arrangements you may notice the plants need time to fill back out and start looking their best again. Starting a separate garden bed for flowering plants you intend to use in arrangements is always a great idea. This helps avoid cutting away the beauty in your gardens that you had planted for other purposes whether it was for beauty or to help out the pollinators.
- Starting this flower cutting garden is best in sunny locations. Preferably 6+ hours of sunlight.
- Packing the cutting garden full of plants will help create straighter flower stems while growing.
- Planting in order from tallest to shortest starting in the north side of the space and working south helps allow maximum sun access to all plants.
- Plant in color schemes so there's no question the flowers will compliment each others in arrangements when the time comes.
- Plant in a easy to access spot. Youre going to visit the cutting garden often to keep up with deadheading and harvesting to encourage consistent bloom growth through out the season.
- Mulching helps manage weed growth and retain moisture in the garden bed.
- Rotating garden beds each season helps keep soil richer in nutrients.
- Consider using methods to keep plants protected from bunnies and deer.
